

About the Book

Baby's Firsts

Endearing rhyming text highlights the developmental milestones babies encounter before their first birthday—crying, smiling, eating, teething, rolling, crawling, walking, and talking. Join the celebration as three babies, encouraged by their families, grow more and more active, culminating in a birthday celebration for all the kids.

Preparing for an Event

You will, of course, create your own grand event! Following are simply suggested ways to engage with families.

____ Locate a copy of the picture book **Baby's Firsts** by Nancy Raines Day and illustrated by Michael Emberley (Charlesbridge Publishing).

_____ If this event is for the public, print out the event poster (page 7), add your date, time, and location, and duplicate it to advertise the event. If you prefer to adapt the poster in your design software, you can find a JPEG of the poster design on CuriousCityDPW.com. Simply search for "firsts" at CuriousCityDPW.com and navigate to the kit listing. The font on the poster is Chaloops.

____ If you list your events in print or online, here is some text that may assist you:

Being a new parent is a whirlwind of new experiences. The picture book **Baby's Firsts** by Nancy Raines Day and illustrated by Michael Emberley (Charlesbridge Publishing) recognizes that not only is your baby having "firsts" nearly every day, but so are you. Join us as we read this story and explore why singing, talking, reading, and playing are some of the greatest gifts you can give your child. All welcome, but best for families with babies and toddlers.

Decorating: Early Literacy Pennants

We have designed pennants with the four primary parent directives for early childhood literacy — Read, Sing, Talk, Play — on the flags. These directives are expanded in the takeaway flyer entitled "Baby's Firsts to Enjoy Every Day."

____ Print the pennants on pages 8-11. The more copies you print, the longer your string of pennants will be.

____ Include the white tabs when you cut out the pennants.

_____ Fold the white tab toward the back of the pennant.

____ Hook the tab over a string or ribbon and seal the tab to the back of the pennant with glue or tape.

Activity: Party Hat

The babies on the final spread of **Baby's Firsts** are wearing party hats as they celebrate a first birthday. We have designed Michael Emberley's sequential art around the brim of a conical hat with lots of white space in case someone wants to color. These hats, ready to color and assemble, make a good activity for early arrivals. If you have a supply of premade party hats, consider trimming off the bottom section of the template and gluing it to the hat.

- ____ Print the Party Hat cut-outs on pages 12-14.
- ____ Decide if you want to pre-cut the templates before the event.
- _____ Decide whether or not you want to secure the hats to patrons' wee heads. Strips of scrap paper taped to hat's edge and looped under the chin works well.
- ____ Check your supply of crayons, child-safe scissors, glue sticks, and tape.
- _____You may consider offering pompoms or other craft accents for the hats.

Takeaway: Early Literacy Tips

Assisting families with early literacy is an investment in your future patrons and the whole community. We have created a simple handout to remind families of the importance of talking, singing, reading, and playing with their child.

____ Print enough copies of "Baby's Firsts to Enjoy Every Day" (page 15) for each family.

_____Consider integrating the talking points of each of the four features into your circle time with families. Every Child Ready to Read (<u>http://</u> <u>everychildreadytoread.org/</u>), a resource from the Public Library Association and the Association for Library Service to Children, can help you develop your early literacy engagement skills.



Takeaway: Log of Baby's Firsts

For many new families, the baby book where every milestone was written down is a thing of the past. New families are snapping pictures on their phones and sharing milestones on social media. As lovers of both the old logs and the new media, we created a sheet to pin to the refrigerator. There, milestone dates or ages in weeks or months can be recorded.

Print enough copies of "Baby's Firsts: Snap & Share" (page 16) for each family.
Consider putting this and the "Baby's Firsts to Enjoy Every Day" in lunch bags for take away. The individual squares on "Baby's Firsts to Enjoy Every Day" make great labels for takeaway bags if you are so inclined.

Engagement for Read Aloud

Baby's Firsts offers so many opportunities for families to engage their baby or toddler. Librarian and storytime veteran Meghan Day offers these spread by spread motions for engagements:

First cry. [Sad face/voice, baby cry motion]

First meal. [Rub tummy]

First burp. Warm feel. [Hug baby close.]

First poop, first pee. First change, pew-ee! [Make smelly face, wave hand.]

All snug on lap. First song, [Sing "La, la."] then nap. [Close eyes, make sleep hand motion.]

First grab, [Grab baby's hands.] *first smile.* [Smile/point to mouth.]

First laugh. [Laugh "haha."] What style!

First teeth. [Point to teeth.] First bite. [Make biting motion with mouth.] *Need bath tonight.* [Move hands in splashing motion.]

First roll, [Roll hands, as in "Wheels on the Bus."] *then creep*.

First crawl, [Crawl fingers up baby.] then sleep. [Make sleep hand motion, eyes closed.]

First game. [Peek-a-boo.] First ride. [Bounce baby on lap.] First swing. [Rock baby back and forth in swing motion.] First slide. ["Slide" baby down lap and say "wheeee!"]

First step, [Kick baby's feet slowly.] *then walk.* [Kick baby's feet faster.]

First word, [Say "Da-da!"] *then talk.* [Say many words on the page.]


What fun, first year. First birthday is here! [Clap and cheer or sing "Happy Birthday to You."]
























BABY'S FIRSTS to enjoy every day!

Singing delivers comfort, new words, rhythm and rhyme, and playfulness - all the perfect ingredients for babies. Don't like your singing voice? No worries, your baby LOVES it.

Read
