THE KIT

This kit was designed for librarians, educators, and booksellers, and for families hosting playgroups, parties, or simply looking for an engaging read aloud. Best for ages 3-6.

The picture book opens with a Godzilla-like attack on the city of Megalopolis. It ends with the realization that Rodzilla is actually the toddler Rod laying waste to a city of toys and leaving a trail of goo that every parent or older sibling will recognize. With the kit, you can turn your readers into Rodzilla with a mask and a miniature paper bus to clutch in their monster claws. Readers can replicate Rodzilla's "goo" with a non-toxic slime recipe to take home.

The kit contains:

- Poster and copy to share your event
- Suggested preparation
- Cut-out mask template
- Cut-and-fold bus template
- Slime recipe (best for over age 4)



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PREPARING FOR THE ACTIVITIES

You will, of course, create your own grand program or classroom activity! Following are simply suggested ways to prepare for an event or classroom experience.

___ Locate a copy of the picture book **RODZILLA** by Rob Sanders and illustrated by Dan Santat (Simon & Schuster).

___ If you list your events in newsletters and/or online calendars, here is some text that may help with those listings:

This just in! There's a Rodzilla on the loose! Is he a monster...or just your...toddler? Tune in for the full report at Story Hour! We will be reading the riotous picture book **RODZILLA** by Rob Sanders and illustrated by Caldecott Medalist Dan Santat (Simon & Schuster) and playing with your child's inner monster. All welcome, but best for ages 3-6.

___ If you are doing a pre-event display, raid the toy box and see if you can make the miniature city of Megalopolis like the picture book creators did.

___ If this event is for the public, print out the event poster (page 6), add your date, time, and location, and duplicate it to advertise the event. If you prefer to adapt the poster on your computer, you can find a JPEG of the poster design on CuriousCityDPW.com. Simply search for "rodzilla" and navigate to the Story Hour Kit listing. The fonts on the poster are CoopForged and CoopBold.

PLAYING THE ROLES

The book is narrated by the on-the-scene reporter and plays out like a goofy monster movie.

___ Consider dressing like a reporter and using a real or prop microphone like the reporter for story hour.

Is Rodzilla a monster? A dinosaur? Or...your typical toddler? With a few cut-outs you can transform your readers into Rodzilla. This kit contains a Rodzilla mask and a small paper bus cut-out for the giant monster to clutch in his pudgy fist.

___ Print the Rodzilla Mask on page 7 on card stock or regular paper. Make sure you print enough so each reader gets one.

___ Will you pre-cut the masks for readers? The simplest way to cut out the eye holes is to fold the mask in half, cut from the edge, cut out the eyes, unfold, and then tape the cut edges of the mask.

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___ Decide how you will affix the masks. You can have readers tape a popsicle or paint stir stick to the back or hole punch the sides and run string through. Secure whatever supplies you need.

___ Print Rodzilla's Bus Model on page 8 on card stock or regular paper. Will you pre-cut the buses for readers? Make a prototype for readers to see. Cut on the solid lines and fold in on the dashed lines. Make sure you print enough so that each reader gets one.

___ Rodzilla wears a t-shirt that reads, "Totally Rod." Do you have access to plain t-shirts and non-toxic fabric markers so that kids can make their own shirts?

___ Consider creating a Rodzilla photo booth or simply taking pictures to share. With their masks on, your readers' identities will be hidden. If you share photos online with the hashtag #RodzillaBook, the picture book's creators will get to follow your event.

___ On the last two spreads of the book we discover that the Rodzilla action is all imaginative play. Consider gathering blocks and toy vehicles for readers to build their own Megalopolis.

SLIMING STORY TIME

As you may have already experienced, Rodzilla produces some "slime missiles." We have created a take-home sheet that allows families to make their own non-toxic Rodzilla Slime at home (not recommended for children under 4). The instructions even offer a label to affix to a slime container.

___ Print the Rodzilla Slime Recipe sheets on page 9. Cut them lengthwise. Make sure you print enough so that each reader gets one.

DAY OF THE EVENT

___ Lay out your masks, bus templates, and the supplies needed to assemble them.

___ Lay out the Rodzilla Slime Recipe as a take-home item.

___ Lay out blocks and toy vehicles for readers to build their own Megalopolis.

___ Read the picture book **RODZILLA** by Rob Sanders and illustrated by Dan Santat (Simon & Schuster). Use your best on-the-scene reporter voice!

___ Lead mask making, bus folding, and possible picture taking!

___ Send kids (older than 4) home with the Rodzilla Slime Recipe.

___ When everyone is gone, repeat after me, "I am totally Rod at Story Time. I am so totally Rod."

MASK

INSTRUCTIONS

STEP 1: PRINT MASK OUT (CARD STOCK PAPER)

STEP 2: CUT OUT WITH SCISSORS

STEP 3: GLUE OR TAPE POPSICLE STICK TO BOTTOM
OR ATTACH STRING TO THE HOLES ON SIDE




All the young monsters need a bus to clutch in their claws to show how big and mighty they are!

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BUS MODEL

- 1) Print on card stock or regular paper.
- 2) Cut on the solid lines.
- 3) Fold in on the dashed lines, keeping the images on the outside.
- 4) Tape the underside of the bus.

 Cut on solid lines, fold on dashed lines.

RODZILLA

SLIME RECIPE

Chances are that you do not want to voluntarily make slime the way Rodzilla does. With this simple recipe, you can drop slime missiles on Megalopolis that do NOT come from your nostrils.

THIS RECIPE IS NON-TOXIC, BUT SHOULD NOT BE EATEN!!

Not recommended for children (or monsters) under the age of 4.

NEEDED FOR SLIME:

- 2 (4-ounce) bottles washable school glue
- 2 or more drops of food coloring
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 - 3 tablespoons contact lens saline solution
- Measuring spoons
- Mixing bowl
- Mixing spoon
- Airtight container for storage

MAKING SLIME:

- Pour the glue into a medium bowl. Stir in the food coloring.
- Add the baking soda. Add the baking soda to the glue mixture and stir until smooth.
- Add the contact lens solution. Pour in 2 tablespoons of the contact lens solution and stir slowly. The mixture should begin to harden, becoming stringy.
- Mix until a ball forms. Continue mixing slowly until a ball of slime forms.
- Knead by hand. Pick up the slime and work between your two hands, until smooth. If the slime is particularly slimy, work in another 1/2 tablespoon of contact lens solution as needed.
- Store in an airtight container at room temperature.
- Wrap the container with the official label from the city of Megalopolis (below).
