

What We Saw "Around the Neighborhood" An Activity for Families and Early Childhood Classrooms

One of the strongest things you can do to build a child's literacy skills is to relate the books you read with that child to the real world around her. Additionally, a great way to build a child's growing perception of math and numbers is to count the objects in her day-to-day world.



Can you take your child on a walk and look for things in your neighborhood? Can you spot birds, dogs, or a lone cat? Can you count the number of animals you see as you go and review them when you get back home? For example, "We saw five birds, three dogs, and one cat in a window." Remember to relate this walk back to the book as you explore the neighborhood and to recall your walk when you read the book. You might even hum the music from the back of the book as you walk to reinforce the sweet connection.



Make this a habit on your walks and keep a log of what you saw. Writing in front of your child also reinforces important literacy skills. Children want to learn to write when they see their caregivers writing.

Encourage your child to "write" in the log as well. When your child make marks or scribbles on the page, he is taking steps towards actual writing in the future. We have included an What We Saw Around the Neighborhood sheet in the packet for you to record your ongoing adventures.

Counting Around the Neighborhood A Freebie for Parents, Childcare Providers, Schools, and Libraries

Holding a Special Story Hour An Activity for Libraries and Early Childhood Classrooms

Locate a copy of the picture book Around the Neighborhood: A Counting Lullaby by Sarah L. Thomson and illustrated by Jana Christy (Amazon Children's Publishing).
Copy and display the Story Hour poster in this kit and hand it out in your community.
List the event in newsletters and online calendars with copy such as: Families will take a trip Around the Neighborhood when we read from Sarah L. Thomson's picture book. We will sing and hum along to this new version of the classic lullaby "Over in the Meadow" and then play a game of animal identification, counting, and simple crafting. Each child will go home with a necklace of counting cards. Best for babies, toddlers, and preschoolers.
What You Might Prepare A Few Days in Advance of the Event:
What You Might Gather: Thick string or yarn Cardstock Single-hole hole puncher 10 business size envelopes (#10's work well) Scissors, glue stick, and scotch tape
What You Might Do: Cut the thick string or yarn into 12"-15" pieces. Wrap one end of the yarn or string tightly with scotch tape to create an end like that of a shoelace that is easily threaded through a hole.
Print out the ten Around the Neighborhood Posters.
Cut the top flaps off of 10 business-sized envelopes.
Glue envelopes to bottom of Around the Neighborhood Posters with the open section in front.
Fold the excess envelope sides to the back of the poster and tape securely. You should now have 10 Around the Neighborhood Posters with pockets.


Around the Neighborhood Kit (Page 5)

Print out the Around the Neighborhood Counting Cards on cardstock. Print enough sheets for every anticipated child at Story Hour.
Cut the cards and hole punch a hole in one corner of the each.
Sort the counting cards by type and load them into the pockets of the corresponding posters.
Take the card with the book on it and thread it onto the string to get the children started on their counting necklaces. This particular card will help them connect the book to the activity.
Print out the What We Saw Around the Neighborhood sheets to give to families to encourage them to go on literacy-rich walks with their children.
What You Might Do The Day of the Event:
Hang the ten Around the Neighborhood Posters with pockets full of Around the Neighborhood Counting Cards around your space at child level.
Lay the prepared strings and the What We Saw Around the Neighborhood sheets on a table.
Welcome families to Story Hour and read Around the Neighborhood: A Counting Lullaby by Sarah L. Thomson and illustrated by Jana Christy (Amazon Children's Publishing).
The book's text is set to the classic lullaby, "Over in the Meadow." Try having families sing the lines on the right hand spread after you read or sing them. For each verse, the children can do an action that corresponds to the animal's: Clap hands for "play," sniff the air for "sniff," make a pouncing motion with both hands for "pounce," etc.
Use the final spread to count out loud with families.
Tell the families that all ten of the animals in the book are hiding somewhere in the library. Have the children search for the posters, do the action on each poster, and then take a card from each envelope. Families can come back to the table, thread the cards onto the string in numerical order, and tie the string into a necklace.
As the families are done, hand out the What We Saw Around the Neighborhood sheets to encourage families to go on literacy-rich walks with their children.
Let families know they can print out counting posters for free off the author's website. The web address is on the cards.

What We Saw "Around the Neighborhood"

Take a walk in your neighborhood with your child. Look for animals or objects to talk about and count. When you get home, write down the animals or objects you saw and how many you saw! You can also take paper or a sketchpad with you to draw while you are exploring. Let your child also "write", scribble, or draw what you saw together.

Why is this a good activity to do together? This simple time outdoors followed by time indoors, talking about your adventure, helps your child make connections that are good for his or her growing, curious brain. Whenever you take time to Read, Explore, Count, and Discuss, you are helping your child grow up healthy and smart!















- PLACE AND CENTER YOUR ENVELOPE HERE POCKET SIDE UP

- TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET








Sniff and wag your tail like a Puppy and take a card.


- PLACE AND CENTER YOUR ENVELOPE HERE POCKET SIDE UP

- TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET






Pounce like a Kitten and take a card.

- PASTE THE ENVELOPE DOWN
- FOLD THE EXCESS ENVELOPE EDGES AROUND TO THE BACKSIDE OF THIS SHEET.
- TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET







Spin in a circle like a Spiderling and take a card.

- THE TOP OF THE ENVELOPE SHOULD LINE UP WITH THIS LINE.
- PASTE THE ENVELOPE DOWN
- FOLD THE EXCESS ENVELOPE EDGES AROUND TO THE BACKSIDE OF THIS SHEET.
- TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET










Crawl like a Ladybug and take a card.

- THE TOP OF THE ENVELOPE SHOULD LINE UP WITH THIS LINE.
- PASTE THE ENVELOPE DOWN
- FOLD THE EXCESS ENVELOPE EDGES AROUND TO THE BACKSIDE OF THIS SHEET.
 - TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET








Hop up and down like a Bunny and take a card.

- PLACE AND CENTER YOUR ENVELOPE HERE POCKET SIDE UP
- THE TOP OF THE ENVELOPE SHOULD LINE UP WITH THIS LINE.
- PASTE THE ENVELOPE DOWN
- FOLD THE EXCESS ENVELOPE EDGES AROUND TO THE BACKSIDE OF THIS SHEET.
- TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET







Hum like a Honeybee and take a card.

- PLACE AND CENTER YOUR ENVELOPE HERE POCKET SIDE UP
- THE TOP OF THE ENVELOPE SHOULD LINE UP WITH THIS LINE.
- PASTE THE ENVELOPE DOWN
- FOLD THE EXCESS ENVELOPE EDGES AROUND TO THE BACKSIDE OF THIS SHEET.
- TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET








Caw and flap your wings like a Crow and take a card.

- PLACE AND CENTER YOUR ENVELOPE HERE POCKET SIDE UP
- THE TOP OF THE ENVELOPE SHOULD LINE UP WITH THIS LINE.
- PASTE THE ENVELOPE DOWN
- FOLD THE EXCESS ENVELOPE EDGES AROUND TO THE BACKSIDE OF THIS SHEET.
- TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET








Dive and quack like a Duckling and take a card.

- PLACE AND CENTER YOUR ENVELOPE HERE POCKET SIDE UP
- PASTE THE ENVELOPE DOWN
- FOLD THE EXCESS ENVELOPE EDGES AROUND TO THE BACKSIDE OF THIS SHEET.
 - TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET







Soar like a Swallow and take a card.

- PLACE AND CENTER YOUR ENVELOPE HERE POCKET SIDE UP
- THE TOP OF THE ENVELOPE SHOULD LINE UP WITH THIS LINE.
- PASTE THE ENVELOPE DOWN
- FOLD THE EXCESS ENVELOPE EDGES AROUND TO THE BACKSIDE OF THIS SHEET.
- TAPE DOWN THOSE EDGES ON THE BACKSIDE OF THE SHEET
